Loch Salann Melee Madness



30 Years!!! Yes, 30 years of **Loch Salann Melee Madnesses** will have occurred on **June 2nd & 3rd 2012**, at its very unique, incredibly ancient and honorable site at the castle in back of the Utah State Hospital in Provo, Utah. Fighting, archery, thrown weapons, relaxing in the sun—what more could you want? Come on out and be able to say to your grandchildren that **YOU WERE THERE!** Opening announcements are tentatively planned for 10:00 AM on Sat. (or whenever the event steward thinks that enough fighters have shown up). Should we gather a sufficient number of fighters (42 seems to be the magic number), the full-on castle siege scenario will occur!! While all this is going on, the competitions for Baronial archery and thrown weapons champions will also be taking place. On Sunday morning, weather allowing and by the request of HRM Sean, a special pas d'arms, celebrating the anniversaries of many illustrious knights (**5** shall be the number of the counting), will be held, hosted by House Catwing and open to all fighters; see the event steward for details. Bring your nicest banners and fighting clothes, and display your skills at weapons and words. *Note: Fiberglass spears with 2" Mandrake stabbing tips will **NOT** be allowed at this event!*

If you've **ever** wanted to run/sponsor an activity/contest or teach a class (fighting or non-fighting), this is the place to do it; just clear it with the event steward and appropriate coordinator. While the site will officially **OPEN** by 8:00 AM on Saturday, and **CLOSE** at 10:00 PM on Sunday, we will be allowed to set up tents on Friday night after 5:30 PM. Unless told otherwise, camping is only allowed this year on the field in front of the castle; please contact the event steward beforehand if you plan on camping overnight. Even though this will be a 2-day activity, participants are encouraged to come early on Sat, and bring picnic lunches and sunshades/tents (although there are numerous shade trees). This is a **VERY DRY** site! Because this is a state facility, anyone bringing alcoholic beverages onsite or found to be in an inebriated condition must be politely asked to leave immediately! Off-site merchants are only 4-6 minute away, and while ground fires are not permitted, off-ground firepits, hibachis, and gas grills are. Pets are welcome if accompanied by responsible owners. The **SITE FEE** is \$8 for adults (16 yrs. Old and older), \$4 for youths, 5 yrs. Old and younger are free and pregnant ladies get a \$2 rebate; per **Family** price cap of \$24 (not per household!). Make checks payable to "Barony of Loch Salann, SCA Inc."

DIRECTIONS: Take I-15 to the Provo center street exit 267: drive east on Center St. (about 2 miles) and enter the hospital grounds. Continue east and turn left at the large planter in the road; follow the road around and up to the castle area (the "off limits" signs aren't meant for us).

Pre-registration of your entries is required a minimum of 8 days before the event for all entries.



Eastertide(April 2012)



Greetings unto the people of Loch Salann, from Sister Scholastica of Saint Catherine's Abbey. The information included in this article is not meant to convert anyone, it is indented to give you a little insight into the kind of information a medieval person would know, and thereby enrich your "medieval" view of life in the middle ages

For some Easter is the most sacred festival in the Christian calendar, for others the welcome signs of spring and warmer days, for others a break from the dreary winter months, For me it is probably a little of all three. Eastertide, April 8th, the most important annual religious feast in the

Christian liturgical year. According to scripture Jesus was resurrected from the dead on the third day after his crucifixion. Eastertide is the celebration that lasts for forty days from Easter Day until the Ascension day. The first week following Easter is known as the Octave.

Early Christians craftily incorporated many pagan spring traditions into their celebrations, changing their symbolism to match Christian ideas. The egg, originally honored the goddess of spring and dawn. Since eggs could not be eaten during Lent, but the hens didn't know to stop laying, therefore in order to make them last, they were boiled. For Christians symbolizes the stone rolled away from the sepulcher, In the north of England colored eggs are called Pace, but few probably realize that when they are rolling eggs down a hill, the act used to symbolize the rolling away of the stone that covered the tomb. During the reign of Edward I four hundred eggs were boiled and distributed to the royal household on one Easter Sunday. Most were colored by vegetable dyes, but some were covered with gold leaf. Romans decorated eggs and Crusaders discovered that the Arabs did too.

Why so confused, M'lady???????

They say a little information is dangerous, and there will probably be people who will disagree with me. In doing research for my Arts and Sciences display for Defenders Tourney, I was again reminded that in using titles, we have strayed from the proper use of titles in the SCA. First it should be understood that many titles in the SCA are not historically accurate, but are devices used in "our game". The forms of address I am going to discuss here are based on the way it was explained to me. One of the mistakes people often make is to try to include all a person's awards or titles into one address. It was explained to me back in the dim reaches of history, that during the actual middle ages, a person did not have multiple titles. So, even though, you might hear "Baron Sir Master John" this title is truly not correct. DON'T PANIC, no one is going to get mad, or take away your birthday, if you make a mistake when addressing someone in the SCA, but here are a few rules that might help.



The King is someone who has won a Crown tournament and is currently reigning. The crown they wear might best identify them. Both the King and Queen can be properly addressed as Your Majesty.

The Crown Prince/Princess, is a person who has won a Crown tourney, or their consort, they are crown Prince/Princess until they ascend the thrones. They are addressed as Your Highness



Royal Peers

When the King and Queen step down (are replaced by the next King and Queen) their title changes to Count/Countess, Their Coronets are now embattled, or crenulated, and they are addressed as "Your Excellencies"



If a person has been King/Queen more than once, they have the title of Duke/Duchess, their coronets have strawberry leaves (trefoils) on them and they are addressed as "Your Grace."

Viscount/ Viscountess, this is a title given to someone who in the past was Prince or Princess, in our area that means that either they were either Prince/princess of the Principality of the Outlands or Principality of Artemisia. The proper title for this person is Viscount (name). So the Title would sound like: Viscount William, or Vicountess Caryn, but it would not properly be Duchess Viscountess Caryn, or Viscount Sir William.

Founding Baron/Baroness, This title is given to those persons deemed by the Crown as being most responsible for the founding of the Barony. Even though they would both stress that it was a joint effort. These two individuals, Mistress Ferelith MacDonald, and Sir Robert de Spencer are founding Baroness and Baron. The proper form of addressed as Mistress Ferelith Baroness Loch Salann... note there is no OF between the title Baroness and the name of the barony.



Territorial or Landed Baron/Baroness, This title is given to those people who represent the King on a Baronial Level. They are the face of the Crown, to their people. The proper way to address them is: Your Excellency, or Your Excellency Bjorn Baron of Loch Salann, or Master Bjorn of Loch Salann, or THL (The Honorable Lady) Jennet Baroness of Loch Salann. Please note that the title Baron or Baroness does not properly go before the name of the Territorial Baron or Baroness.

Court Baron/Baroness, These are people the Crown has recognized for various reasons as permanent members of the royal court. They are properly addressed as Baron (name). So for example you might address Mistress Ann de Junius as Baroness Ann, or Baroness Ann de Junius, or refer her as The Baroness de Junius, but you would not properly address her as Baroness Mistress Ann.

Peers (Knight, Pelican, Laurel). These people are addressed as Sir (for Knights), Master or Mistress. When someone has multiple peerages, they are called by only one title at any given time. So for example I am Mistress Leah de Spencer, but if I am wearing armor or if you would like you could address me as Sir Leah, but not Mistress Sir Leah.

Grant of Arms. This confers on the person the title of Honorable Lord/Lady of Lordship/ Ladyship. The people with this title have the title THL before their name and are referred to as His Lordship or The Honorable Lord so and so or Her Ladyship (name)

Award of Arms. This award means that the person now has a title of Lord or Lady. Historically this was a peerage in the real world, but for the SCA it is the first level of nobility. That is the reason that Lady Mary Uffington kept the title of Lady after she was made a knight.

A person without an Award of Arms, is referred to as my-lord or my-lady. When in doubt, you can always fall back on this title.

I hope this sheds some light on titles and how they are suppose to be done. If someone wants to show all their titles, they generally do it in writing by adding the initials, for their peerages after their name. If you have any heartburn with something I said, I am happy to be corrected,

I got my information from years of playing and from these documents.

Camping Preparation and Organization in the SCA

Our wonderful Chronicler asked me to write a brief article on SCA Camping Preparation that covers the basics, similar to the class I'll be teaching at Southern Collegium. What makes me such an expert? Well, I've been doing this for over 20 years, and I've been the Household Camp Steward for Barony Ashton for about 10 of those, organizing a camp and kitchen for upwards of 50 people, so you might say I'm experienced. The very first step in the process is deciding what to take, followed by packing, set-up, the actual Event, and tear-down.

First, what to take. You should break this down into 3 categories; Necessities, Really Want, and Nice to Have. Necessities are, of course, the things you HAVE to have, like your food, bed, shelter, medicines, and clothing. Really Want is the stuff that you want to take, but can live without if you forget it, like your armor, A&S projects, alcohol [if you drink], and toiletries. Why are toiletries here and not in Necessities? Because if you forget your shower stuff you can probably borrow some from a friend. Nice to Have is the stuff that you can easily live without/borrow, like sunscreen, extra garb, camp/tent decorations, and extra weapons. When you make these lists, be honest. Armor is NEVER a Necessity, no matter how much you want to fight. While making your Necessities list, don't forget foul-weather gear/garb -- it's not uncommon for Uprising to have 100 degree days *and* 50 degree downpours *and* 30 degree nights, and it has even *snowed* at Uprising, so plan to experience everything the weather can throw at you, and you won't be caught off-guard.

Having determined what you want to take with you, it's time to figure what you CAN take with you, i.e., what will fit in the car. A *very* important thing to consider, which SCAdians often overlook, is the vehicle's actual weight limit compared to its usable volume. That means that we have a tendency to think "if it fits in my car, I can carry it," which is far from true, and can lead to some very bad and expensive consequences. Look at it this way: Let's say your sedan has a 3 ft x 2 ft x 1 ft trunk, that's 6 cubic feet of volume. Where we run into trouble is that we forget that 6 cubic feet of armor weighs substantially more than 6 cubic feet of sleeping bags. Every car has, in its owner's manual, the maximum load info, so look it up before loading, and don't forget to deduct for the passengers' weight as well. Not overloading your vehicle may mean you need someone else to haul

some of your stuff for you. If that happens, keep your bed stuff with you, send the stuff you need the least with them -- this is important because they may be delayed in arriving, and when midnight rolls around you'll be wishing you'd sent the armor with them and brought your sleeping bag rather than the reverse. **IMPORTANT NOTE.** If someone is hauling stuff for you, offer them some gas money, even if they're carrying only one bag! Yes, they were going to go whether they were carrying your stuff or not, but even 25 lbs changes gas mileage over long distances, so pay up! Odds are if it's a single/small thing they're carrying for you they'll probably say no to the gas money, but **ALWAYS** offer it.

Okay, it's time to pack, so just toss it all in there and away we go, right? **WRONG!** That is the absolute best method to make sure that your food cooler sits on the kitchen floor waiting for you to get back. Take the lists you made regarding the relative importance of your stuff, and use it to make a packing list. My packing list is minutely detailed, down to the individual items in my shaving kit, number of socks, and every single other item that I intend to take. I also separate my list into "packed" and "loaded;" nothing gets completely checked off until after I have personally put it in the vehicle.

So now we've made to the event site, time to set up! If you are camping alone, it's fairly straightforward. Set up tent[s] first, set up kitchen second, set up interior decor last.

If you are camping with a group it gets a bit more involved. Every group of 10 or more should have a designated Camp Steward, the person who is in charge of making sure your camping area has room for everyone's tent, planning things like trash and water runs, and making sure all the torches and fires are out before going to bed. When camping in a larger group, odds are you'll have a large kitchen area/tent and a large community-use/dining pavilion/tent, and it's highly possible that you and/or several of your camp-mates will be camping in period pavilions of good size, which need more than one or two people to set up. So, in a large group camp with large pavilions, this should be your "order of attack." Get everyone unloaded as close as possible to where their tent will be. Set up the roof of the large community tent first, leaving as many sides open as the weather allows; if the weather is un-cooperative you can move everyone's stuff under the big top and wait for a break to set up the next/rest. Set up the kitchen tent and fire pit so that someone can start some dinner while you finish with the tents. After the two community tents, start with the largest pavilion and work your way down the scale, setting up the tent but **NOT** doing the "interior decorating" until **ALL** the tents are up. As your crew moves from big tents to smaller tents it will be possible to set up two at a time, then some people will be able to start "decorating" as you get down to just a few small tents left. When you are at the point of interior set up, do the bed first. The rest can wait until tomorrow if necessary.

For large group camp kitchens I make the following suggestions. Put one person in charge; plan your whole event menu well in advance; everyone gives your Chef the money to buy the food at least a month before, and let him/her buy it. Make a Chore Chart, equally dividing the cooking and cleaning duties -- no one should **HAVE** to cook more than a couple of times, nor should one person get stuck doing the dishes day after day. Plan a simple hot soup for the set-up day, help-yourself sandwiches for lunches, and a cold breakfast/cooler clean-out for tear down day. With good planning there's no reason you can't have things like Prime Rib, Whole Roast Turkey, and Crab Fettuccini while camping [yes, we've done all of these at Uprising].

Alas, the event is over, time to go. Basically just do your set up process in reverse, and you'll be in great shape. A great way to keep kids busy and out of the way is to give them trash bags and have them clean up the camp area, fullest bag wins a prize. One very important point, to me at least, regarding group camp tear down. Unless **VITALLY** necessary, **NO ONE** leaves until **EVERYONE** is packed and ready to go. If you've spent the entire weekend eating and taking shelter from the weather in that big ol' tent, stay to help pack it up. Don't just load up your pup tent and say "see you next month."

This is pretty much it. I encourage you all to take the SCA Camping class I'll be teaching at Collegium; there may be input from someone else that helps you even more!

TIME FOR CAMPING

Greetings!

Finally ... it's time for SCA camping. I am so anxious to get out there, set up my tent and enjoy the outdoors along with SCA activities. I've picked up a few things that I'd like to share with you, whether you're new to SCA camping or an experienced camper.

SCA Events are run by Volunteers. Please Volunteer! Most of the folks running an event have already put in more hours than you will spend at that event. Lighten their load. If each attendee volunteered just 2 hours, it would make a HUGE impact on the event. I've met so many wonderful SCAdians by volunteering, and working side by side with someone is a great way to get to know new people.

If you look at volunteering as "I HAVE TO" then it will be a chore—just like when your mom told you to pick up your dirty laundry. However, it really does help to look at volunteering this way: "I **GET** to" do xyz.

Example: I get to walk security on Friday Night so that I can ensure my fellow campers are safe and settled in. (And I can party tomorrow night!)



Mark Twain taught us a great lesson about painting a fence:
Get your friends to help you do that task, and it can be fun for all of you!

There's the formal, scheduled, "I will do XYZ from 8 PM to Midnight" type of commitment, versus the "Hmm, court will start in 30 minutes and the chairs for the populace have to be set up" do-it-on-the-spot activity. We need all types of volunteers!

The weather is never predictable. Be prepared for both hot and cold extremes. Yes, YOU need your own cloak. And so do each of your kids!

Dress in Garb. We want to recreate the Middle Ages, and blue jeans just aren't period! I have a "cover-up" tabard that I can "throw on" to be medieval even though I haven't yet unpacked all my garb.

When camping in a group, be aware of what your group expects you to do. If you have to sign up for camp chores, food prep, cleanup, setup or teardown, be aware and plan to pull your share of the load. Do MORE than the minimum! If you are expected to do one task a day, and you see something needs to be done – DO IT! Don't assume that you are a "guest" to be served by the rest of the group.

Respect other people's property. From Duke Alan's ranchland (Uprising) where he asks us to keep below 5 MPH to preserve the grass, to the big hammer by the tent. Don't take it without permission, and if given permission to borrow it, make sure YOU return anything you borrowed as soon as you are through with it. Your friend may not know where it came from, so don't expect him/her to return it to the right owner.

Speaking of Kids: YOU are responsible for your kids!

I don't expect to feed, watch over or take care of your child. I did that with mine. I want to encourage your child when he or she does good, so help me find those opportunities.

See a family with SCA kids? Share childcare responsibilities – you watch all the kids for 4 hours and they take the other 4 hours. Talk to them about their outgrown SCA garb. Barter is a great form of payment.

Many camping groups have a shared common area, perhaps a dining area. Most of the time, kids can play there, but there are times when the "adults" take over the area. Make sure your kids have a place to go. When I took my young children to camping events, I had a 10 x 10 foot sunshade, with a fake "grass" carpet, table and chairs that was their area. No adult could kick them out. Their toys and games could be there. You can add a cooler for their cold drinks and (healthy?) snacks and a battery operated lantern.

TOURNAMENT SOCIETY

From: *Knighthood & Chivalry Dictionary*

Because of the rising cost and logistical difficulties involved in sponsoring a tournament, during the early and mid 14th century groups of knights in the Bavarian region of Germany banded themselves into small groups for the purposes of sponsoring and participating in tournaments. Barber and Barker (1989) put forth a theory that it was because of these societies that the tournament was more common in Germany than in France or England, and the tournament companies were responsible for their proliferation. For one of these societies, the tournament was to act as an annual assembly, whose members wore the same livery and held a court at the same tournament, to which they were to bring their wives and daughters in order to "bring honor to the society," during which they were to conduct their annual business. All members are to attend, or were fined. A council of four was named to oversee the membership, and members were to help one another in times of war. They founded a chapel in Freising. All members were to own war-horses if they were able. Some German societies elected a king to oversee their members. According to Barker and Barber, "...the society was intended to offer a suitable atmosphere in which chivalric culture could flourish." We have definite records of societies in existence from 1387 to the 1430s, but it is likely that they existed both before and after this.

Within the SCA, the Tournament Societies and the Monarchical knightly orders (the Garter and Star, for example) proved the direct inspiration for the formation of the tournament companies, groups of knights, men-at-arms, and ladies dedicated to particular aspects of the tournament experience. Unfortunately, very little research has been done on the historical tournament societies; presumably some of their documentation lies buried in the German records, to be found by an enterprising scholar.

The monthly cook's guild was held the 4th Tuesday of March. Lady Aingeal, THL Vogg and Mistress Casamira prepared and enjoyed 3 wonderful Celtic dishes at Vogg's castle.

The challenge of early Celtic food is the lack of any books with recipes. The researchers rely on records that include foodstuffs bought or sold, lists of household items, and other commentary about food that might have been recorded. Earthenware vessels were used, not metal pots. Boiling and roasting were the most common cooking method.

Corned Beef

Corned beef in Irish cuisine dates to the 12th century in the poem Aislinge Meic Con Glinne. The corned beef as described in this text was a rare and valued dish, given the value and position of cattle within the culture, as well as the expense of salt, and was unrelated to the corned beef eaten today. Corned beef is salt-cured in "wet brine," which can add flavor (due to spices) and tenderize the meat. "corned" refers to the coarse grains of salt, not to the new world "corn".

Boil the corned beef with the seasoning packet. Add large chunks of peeled and trimmed turnips, parsnips, carrots, onions and cabbage and cook until softened. Serve.
