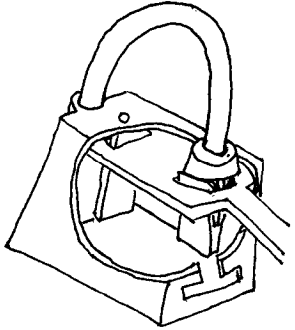
## Viking Age Locks

The Vikings had much more need of locks than did their forefathers. With the increase in trade, and trade towns, they had more expensive things to guard, and more strangers around to steal them.

Viking locks are adaptations of Roman locks. Roman locks, however, had too many precision details to be easily and cheaply manufactured. The Vikings cleverly simplified their construction.



Padlocks (shown left) were common during the Viking age. They were easily constructed by a country smith. When found today, Viking padlocks are almost always locked. The reason for this is that the loop of the lock is not hinged, but is a separate, removable piece. To avoid losing this piece one had to immediately re-lock the lock after use.

The spring mechanism of the padlock is a simple device, but irritating to anyone without the right key. The hole at the shaft end compresses the double bladed springs, while the slot at the end fits over a specially shaped piece of iron, thus preventing the use of unauthorized keys.

The chest lock (shown below) works in another way. The key is shaped more like a modern one and is intended to be twisted. When this is done the prongs slip through the holes of the locking bar and lift the spring on the upper side. A lateral movement of the key in the keyhole and the chest is opened.

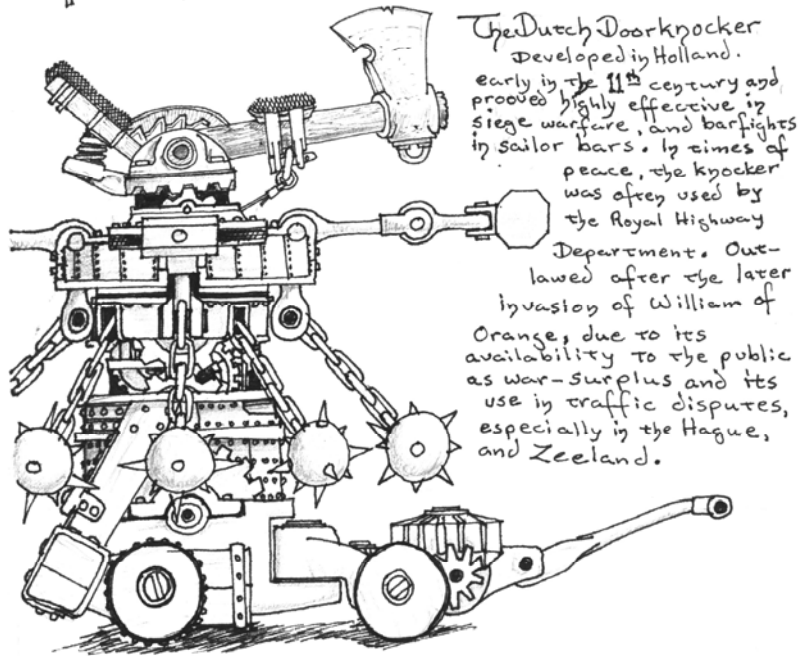

The Dutch Doorknocker developed in Holland early in the 11<sup>th</sup> century and proved highly effective in siege warfare, and barfights in sailor bars. In times of peace, the knocker was often used by the Royal Highway Department. Outlawed after the later invasion of William of Orange, due to its availability to the public as war-surplus and its use in traffic disputes, especially in the Hague, and Zeeland.

## From the Chronicler:

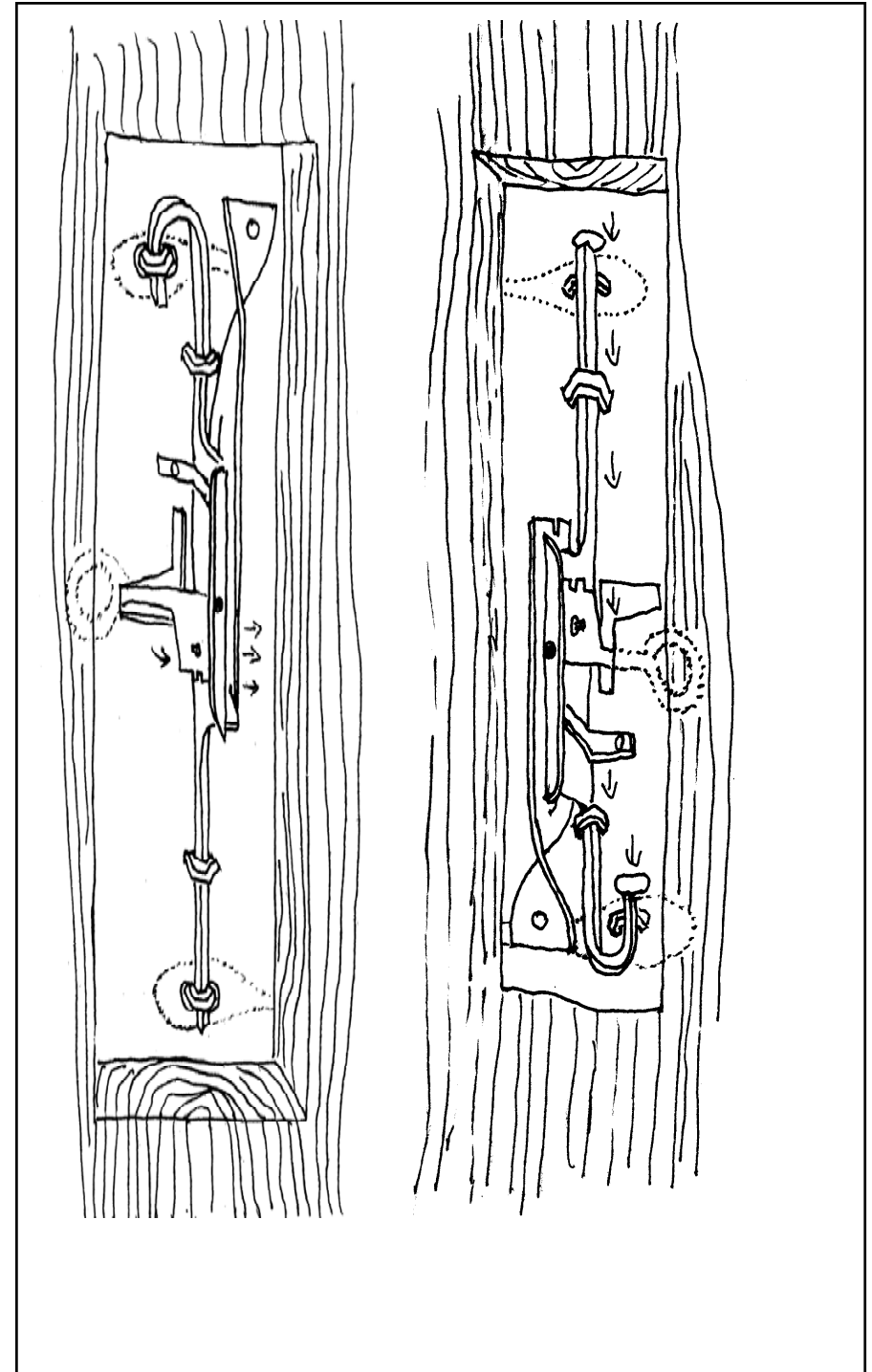

## Edward I

(part six in a continuing genealogy of the Plantagenets)

### By Fiona the Norseman's Daughter

Edward was born at Westminster Palace on 17 July 1239, and named for Henry III's favorite saint and the last Anglo-Saxon king, Edward the Confessor. He had an elegant build, a lofty stature, and was head and shoulders above the height of an ordinary man of his time, with abundant hair that changed from yellow in his childhood to black in manhood and snow white in age. He had a drooping left eyelid, also a characteristic of his father. He had the sinewy, musculare arms of a swordsman and long legs that gave him a grip of the saddle, for which he acquired the nickname Longshanks. The Dominican Nicholas Trivet recorded these traits; he also recorded the Edward delighted in war and tournament and especially in hunting and hawking.

At fifteen, Edward want to Spain to marry the nine-year-old Eleanor of Castile. Edward spent his young manhood learning what happens to poor rulers. He fought the rebel barons led by Simon De Montfort and lost to them at the Battle of Lewes in 1264; he and his father were taken captive and De Montfort took the reins of government. He held them only briefly. Edward escaped, gathered supporters, and defeated De Montfort at Evesham in 1265. Edward worked to pacify the kingdom after that.

In 1270, Parliament passed a tax to allow Edward to go on Crusade with Louis IX of France. Louis died of plague in Tunisia before Edward even joined him. Edward arrived in Acre in May 1271 with a thousand knights; too few to do more than relieve Acre. In 1272, he survived a murder attempt by an Assassin, a member of a shi'ite Muslim order and left for Sicily. Henry III died 16 Nov 1272; Edward was proclaimed king in his absence.

Edward had a concept of community and generally ruled with the welfare of his subjects in mind. He saw the Crown as the judge of the proper course of action for the realm and felt the royal authority should be used for the public good. He attempted to rule with the advice and consent of those whose rights were in question. There was some conflict with the Church during his reign, generally over finances, but Edward was able to work things out more smoothly than his predecessors had. He took up the judicial reforms Henry II had begun, codified many existing laws, some of which originated with the Magna Carta, and dealing with a wide range of issues, including extortion by royal officers, methods of procedure in civil and criminal cases, and freedom of election.

There was much warfare during Edward's reign. Early on, he fought with Philip the Fair of France over Gascony. His longest battles were, however, against Wales and Scotland. He fought against Llewellyn ap Gryffudd, who refused to submit to the English crown, from 1277 to 1282. Llewellyn died in a chance battle that year; his brother David was executed. The Welsh campaigns had produced one of the largest English armies ever to take the field, with 15,000 infantry made up of Anglo-Norman cavalry and Welsh archers. Edward united

2. Edmund of Woodstock, b. 5 August 1301, m. Margaret Wake, 6 October 1325, d. 19 March 1330, beheaded at Winchester.
3. Eleanor, b. 4 May 1306, d. 1311.

Edward fathered out of wedlock John DeBotecourt, b. abt 1262, d. 25 November 1324.

## From the Cook's Corner

On the evening of November 6, 2001, members of the Baronial Cook's Guild gathered at the lovely home of His Lordship Vogg Hrofsson, to prepare and partake of a wonderful meal under the direction of Mistress Casamira Jawjalny. Lordship Vogg and Mistress Casamira were joined the preparation by Lordship James of Penmore, Lady Constance de la Rose, and Lady Rhiannon the Gentle. Master Edward and Mistress Margaret Mendeith arrived later, due to pressing mundane matters. The food was wonderfully delightful and consisted of Borscht (Beet soup) with sour Cream, Brotchan Rua (Leek and Oat Soup), Chicken with Almonds and Cumin, Marog Mheacan Dearg (Carrot Pudding), a Feta Cheese and Mushroom Tart, and a lovely Cheesecake with Cream for dessert. After an enjoyable evening of laughter and puns, the following recipes were decided on to share. Hope you enjoy them.

### Marog Mheacan Dearg (Carrot Pudding)

3/4 pound carrots      1/2 cup butter      1/2 cup sugar  
2 Tbs. heavy cream      6 egg yolks      1/2 cup ground almonds  
2-3 drops orange flower water (optional)

Wash and peel the carrots, leave whole and cook in boiling water until tender, about 8 minutes. Drain and dry off excess moisture. Grate on a coarse grater. Set aside. Beat together the egg yolks and sugar until rich and thick in texture and pale off white in color. Beat in the cream. Soften the butter until the consistency of thick cream but not melted. Beat into the egg/sugar mixture along with the carrots. Stir in the ground almonds. A few drops of orange flower water may be added now, if desired. Pile the mixture into a pie dish. Bake at 400 degrees for 20 minutes; then reduce heat to 350 degrees for a further 35 minutes. Serves 4-6 people.

### Cheesecake

#### Pastry Dough: (per crust)

1 cup flour      2 ounces butter      1 egg yolk  
Water

#### Filling:

1 pound ricotta cheese      1/3 cup sugar      2eggs  
1Tb. ground ginger      1 Tb. butter      1/2 tsp cinnamon  
1 Tb soft bread crumbs      1/4 cup currants

Prepare pastry crust in pan; set aside to rest. Blend cheese, eggs, butter, bread crumbs, sugar, and spices in a food processor or blender until smooth. Fold in the currants. Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Spoon filling into crust. Smooth out top with spoon. Bake 40 minutes or until the top is firm and starting to brown. Cool before serving. if **desired**, serve with sweetened, slightly whipped cream.

Happy Eating, *The Cook's Guild*

Wales to England in 1284, dividing the country into shires and English civil law introduced. His son Edward was born in Caernarvon Castle and was the first English prince to be given the title Prince of Wales.

Scotland didn't come so easy. Alexander III of Scotland died in 1286. Edward arranged for his son, Edward, to wed Margaret, the Maid of Norway, Alexander's daughter and heir, but Margaret died in 1290, on her way to England, leaving the Scottish succession in dispute. Edward arbitrated the Scottish succession in 1291, expecting acknowledgement of his overlordship. Edward chose John Baliol from thirteen different claimants. Baliol did homage to him but then the Scots refused Edward's demands for military service. Edward invaded and defeated Baliol in 1296; Baliol was forced to abdicate and the Scottish barons did homage to Edward as their king.

Edward appointed a trio of Englishmen to rule Scotland and had the Stone of Scone on which Scottish sovereigns were crowned removed to London and made part of the Coronation Chair in Westminster Abbey, where it remained until 1996. The Scots did not stay subdued, however. Sir William Wallace led the Scots in rebellion and defeated the English army at Stirling. Edward won the next round, at the Battle of Falkirk in 1298 but the Scots continued to resist until Wallace's capture, allegedly by treachery of a fellow Scot, and execution in 1305. Robert the Bruce rebelled in 1306, and was crowned King of Scotland at Scone.

By this time, Edward was a lonely old man. His beloved Eleanor had died and his second wife, Margaret, was young enough to be his daughter. He had slight acquaintance and less sympathy with the younger generation; Margaret often sided with her step-children against him. Edward was again on his way to Scotland to attempt to suppress the Scots when he died at Burgh on Sands on 7 July 1307. He was buried at Westminster; his tomb bears the words "*Scottorum malleus*"—Hammer of the Scots.

Edward married Eleanor of Castile on 1 October 1254. Nine of their children died before reaching adulthood. The children were:
