Buttery, Scullery, Pantry, and Larder—What's the Difference?

These were four separate places in most medieval middle to upper class dwellings and monasteries as they had their own functions and placement in the building(s).

The “buttery” was storerooms for large barrels or “butts” of beer and ale and other provisions and was generally a second store room in a typical hall house. It was usually located between the Great Hall and the Kitchen. The word comes from the Old French word “boutellerie” which meant “butt” or “bottle store”) where wine and ale were decanted and stored, along with flagons and cups. This room was very important as in the Middle Ages and Renaissance alcoholic beverages were drunk at every meal and since ale didn't travel well and was always drunk close to where it was made and had to be brewed often. Wine was far more potent and could last a long time in bottles or kegs which required a large storage space. The person who presided over the buttery was called the Butler. In a monastery a buttery was where food and drink were stored for the provisioning of strangers and passing guests at an exterior door (and often via a small serving-hatch in the door, to prevent invasion of the stores by a crowd or by rough beggars).

A scullery was usually a place where plates and dishes were stored in a medieval hall, castle, or monastery. The term (according to the Merriam-Webster Online Dictionary) the came from Middle English words “squilerie” or “sculerie” which meant the department of household in charge of dishes or from the Anglo-French word “esquilerie” which came from the words “escuele” and “eskel” which meant “bowl” or from Latin term of “scutella” which was the word for a drinking bowl.



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It was usually a room located near both the main kitchen as well as a source of water (like a well, barrel that collected rain water, etc.) as they would use the water to wash the pots, pans, and dishes used during the meal there. It was located usually against an outside wall and had a floor made of brick, stone, or tile (in case of leaks or flooding from the water source) which were at least 5 inches thick and would be slightly lower than the main floor of the hall, castle, or monastery. There were no doors directly to store rooms or the pantry or larder from the scullery as the scullery produced a lot of “slop” (liquid spill or flow over the edge of a container, typically as a result of careless handling, food remnants, etc).

The larder was usually a cool room or sometimes a cellar used to store things that needed lower temperatures in order to extend their “shelf life”. Things like meat or sausages (which were stored in large barrels or crocks of lard—pig fat—which is where the name came from

Middle English--denoting a store of meat--word from medieval Latin “lardarium” which came from “laridum” and developed into the Old French “lardier”) were stored in it. The Oxford English Dictionary gives the first recorded use in English as being in 1305 but the rooms can be seen in British architecture from the 11th and 12th centuries onwards as one of two rooms which were provided usually at the ends of hall houses (away from the entrance).




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The larder was a place meat was stored partially cooked and then covered with the lard until it was needed. Dried meat and smoked meat hung in a loft or garret to be stored away from dampness and humidity which developed into a “wet larder” being the cool room or cellar and “dry larder”. The wet larder might also contain milk, dairy products like butter, jams, uncooked meats, game, fresh vegetables, and fresh fruits. The room was also used for the salting of pork, beef, etc. The dry larder contained things like dried fruits and vegetables, grain chests, and certain types of cheese that had a hard rind. If there were loaves of rye bread needed to be saved they were generally buried inside the grain chests. Larders were usually found on the north or west sides of the house which get less sun thus able to stay cooler, were located as far away as possible from walls that had fireplaces or hot flues in any adjacent walls. Some might have a door to an outside courtyard and (if they had windows) the windows would usually be covered by gauze (glass windows would raise the temperatures inside plus the gauze kept out many insects and allowed ventilation) or get indirect ventilation. They had shelves usually of marble or slate two or three inches thick that were wedged into thick stone walls. Certain things placed on the shelves like fish or vegetables were covered with [muslin](#). Handfuls of wet [rushes](#) were sprinkled under and around on the floor to help keep temperatures low as well as they absorbed odors. The Scots called their larders a “Spence” and the person in charge of it a “Spencer”

The term “pantry” came from the latin word “panis” meaning bread which developed into the Old French word of “panterie” which then went to Old English term of “panetrie” which finally became the more modern “pantry”. The terms of “pantry-man” and “pannier” also came from these bases.



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What it basically was was a closet or cupboard where bread used often was stored for the table and it was generally in the same room where the dining took place. It might also include a stone shelf, sometimes called a “thrawl”, which would be used as a larder to keep food cool.

A “pantler” was the servant in charge of the bread and was responsible for slicing it. This position was a prestigious one as the bread was an integral part of a medieval meal. Some studies indicate this position generally was assigned to someone who was a member of the lesser nobility.

The pantler generally dealt with two types of bread: a “manchet” and the “trencher”. The manet was bread made of the finest flour that the household could afford, shaped into roll, and was held in the hand and used to scoop or dip the meal.

The trencher was bread that was made from a combination of rye and wheat flours and was sliced and then the crust was trimmed to make their version of a disposable plate (the word came from the word “trancher” which meant to cut or carve) or were sometimes flat, three-day-old loaves of bread that were cut in half.

On this plate the food was placed (dishes of wood or pottery were generally only used for serving) near the “trencher salt” (an individual salt dish or squat open [salt cellar](#)) and it was changed often as it quickly absorbed the liquids from the food and became soggy (which created another responsibility for the pantler as they had to be aware of the trencher's condition and have ready replacements.



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Used trenchers were either eaten with some type of sauce, given to the poor or fed to animals so as not to waste them.

Sometime around the 1400's the trencher developed into an actual wooden dish that sometimes had a small curved section carved out in which to place their "trencher salt" thus slowly eliminating this responsibility for the pantler.

By the beginning of the 17th century the pantry also became a small room or closet in which a variety of foods could be stored together as it was a cold room (unheated) and had some type of ventilation from outside of the home. This room was moved closer to the kitchen and could contain roasts, meat pies, and other uneaten foods that would be served the next day. The development of this room also brought an additional servant (called a "butler") whose purpose was to be constantly aware of just what was in the pantry.

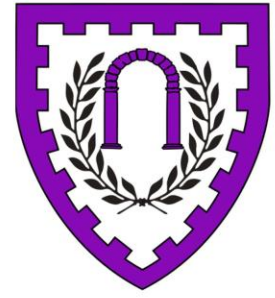
